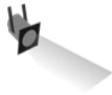

The Human Resources Director is also the Employer's EEO Coordinator.

# The Process of Snow Removal

As the winter season approaches us again, we would like to inform our community of some snow removal procedures and ways you can help this year.

Anytime we get a 3" of snow or more, the Street Department will pile snow in the downtown area to help with business parking. The piles will usually be hauled away within three days of the event. We will also plow alleys when we get 3 inches or more of snow, after the streets have been cleared. For after-hour snow events, the Police Department will contact us when they feel it is necessary for us to come in and plow.

Snow in cul-de-sacs will be plowed to the center of the cul-de-sacs on heavier snow events until all the streets are cleared, the snow will then be removed from the center and piled behind the curbs.

Removing your vehicles and trash containers from the streets and cul-de-sacs would be helpful before or during snow events. This will allow us to plow up next to the curbs or the edge of the streets. Also, please do not shovel or blow snow directly into the streets from sidewalks or driveways. We, as a department, strive to keep our community safe during the winter Season. Thank you for your help in making this a safe snow-removal season.

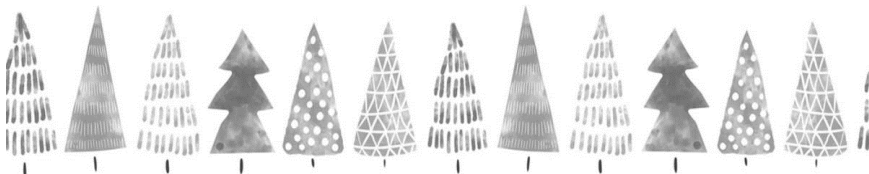
## What's new in Columbia City?

## Electrical Safety Tips for the Holidays

The holiday season is nearly here!

While it's certainly the best time of the year to spend quality time with family and friends, it's also important that you think about keeping your friends and family safe around all the electricity you'll likely be using. Here are a few essential electrical safety tips to consider for the holidays.



1. Before you use any electrical decorations, you should inspect them for damage. Look for damaged sockets, cracked sockets, loose connections, and bare/loose wires. All of these things could cause a fire or a serious shock.

2. Once you've confirmed that all your electrical decorations aren't damaged, when putting up the displays, be sure to follow the manufacturer's use and care instructions that came with the electrical decorations. Be sure to use the extension cords with the right amperage rating to match the amperage needs of your electrical products.

3. When you're installing outdoor decorations, you should be very careful to decorate away from any power lines. You and your equipment should be at least 10 feet from any power lines.

4. Don't overload your home's electrical outlets. Every year, many homeowners end up overloading the electrical outlets in their home because they go overboard when it comes to decorating. Faulty wires and overloaded electrical outlets are the most common causes of fire during the holidays. You should only plug a single, high-wattage appliance into every outlet. This will help you prevent overloading the outlets in your home.

5. You should never connect more than three strands of incandescent lights. Connecting more than three strings can cause a fire or trip circuit breakers. You may think about buying LED lights, which are cooler than incandescent lights and use less energy. Be sure that the spotlights that you use to illuminate decorations are far from flammable items, protected from weather, and are well-ventilated. Make sure that you always unplug your decorations before you replace the fuses or bulbs. Turn off the outdoor and indoor electrical decorations before you go to sleep or leave home.

6. Be sure that any electrical decorations and extension cords were made to be useable outdoors. Keep all light strings and extension cords away from water and snow. You should plug outdoor decorations and electric lights into circuits protected by circuit interrupters and buy portable outdoor GFCIs, if the circuits aren't GFCI protected.
